**Prenatal Alcohol Exposure: The Impact Beyond Birth**

Thursday, April 6, 2017

**Description:** The purpose of this presentation is to educate participants about the impact of prenatal alcohol exposure, and challenge us to look beyond healthy birth outcomes. This talk will help define Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASDs) and how this disorder presents in an individual across the lifespan; as well as explore our knowledge of alcohol, prevalence of alcohol use and women, and the importance of preventing alcohol exposed pregnancies.

**Objectives:**

- Review Describe the effects of alcohol on the developing brain and how this exposure may impact an individual across the lifespan; including an understanding of Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD).
- Define standard drink and binge drinking.
- Discuss the prevalence of alcohol use among women.
- State the importance of delivering a preconception health message that includes the dangers of drinking alcohol while pregnant, and the impact of Screening and Brief Interventions and Treatment (SBIRT).

**Domestic and Intimate Partner Violence: A Paradigm Shift from Intervention to Prevention**

Wednesday, June 14, 2017

**Description:** North Carolina was recognized by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) as one of 14 states with higher than normal risk factors for domestic and intimate partner violence (DIPV). In response, the CDC partnered with the North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence (NCCADV) to develop a plan to address violence across the state. For decades; members of the helping community (physicians, nurses, clinicians, and advocates) used have interventions to address DIPV. Interventions address violence after its occurrence. Primary prevention would address violence prior to onset. Prevention is needed to encourage open and honest dialog, help reduce stigma, and to inform on the severity of violence on victims and the community. Topics will include: an overview of domestic and intimate partner violence; understanding to help help-seeking barriers in victims; and types of primary prevention and strategies for implementation.

**Objectives:**

- Discuss the benefits of primary prevention implementation.
- Explain the differences between intervention and prevention and how each impacts violence.
